## LETTERS AGAINST ISOLATION...

Taking inspiration from the volunteers of 'letters against isolation' pupils spent time handwriting personalised letters for residents at a local care home.

Many senior citizens experience loneliness and this can have an effect not only on their mental health, but their physical health also. The impact of the pandemic only increased the problem of isolation within our community.

Pupils wanted to spread some kindness and warmth through handwritten letters and cards for a local care home in Selly Oak. Pupils wrote about their experiences of lockdown and post-pandemic life, sharing ideas of activities and hobbies they took part in to keep them motivated. Others shared poetry, song lyrics, and stories about school and family life.



We were lucky enough to have been able to hand deliver the letters and meet some of the residents outdoors, socially distanced. The residents were delighted with their mail, it was well received! Our pupils thoroughly enjoyed the visit and we hope to maintain the relationship for the foreseeable future.

## THE REAL MVPs



The Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVP) is a programme designed to help young people speak out against bullying, violence, and abuse. It enables pupils to identify and challenge negative behaviour inside and outside of School.

Our Year 10 pupils volunteered to become UoB School MVPs, and after receiving extensive training, have been working closely with younger pupils delivering pre-planned sessions. Topics covered include mental health and wellbeing, awareness of violence and its effects, bullying in person and online, to name a few.

The programme has been co-produced and developed by sector leads including WM Violence Reduction Unit, the University of Birmingham, The James Brindley Foundation, and Positive Youth Foundation. It is unique, because it's the pupils who take lead. The pupils now play an important role in tackling negative behaviour within the School and community.

Our MVPs are able to develop their skills in leadership and communication, and by using the values that are core to our School (kindness, resilience, empathy, confidence) are having a positive influence in the School environment already.

# DEVELOPING CHARACTER THROUGH SPORT

Physical Education lessons, like our School community, are a true melting pot of interests, beliefs, aptitudes and opinions. We celebrate this in our lessons through a broad and varied curriculum, with a purposeful slant towards Character Education. We strongly that advocate **Physical** Education is much more than simply 'playing sport' and that it is a supportive vehicle to societal flourishing.



From a sporting sense, it is well documented that elite athletes who measure success through intrinsic factors (such as effort, displaying character virtues, experiencing personal growth, rising to the challenge) rather than extrinsic factors (medals, prize money), feel less depleted and have more positive fulfillment and pride. In turn, this motivation energises an athlete to commit to being the best version of themselves, more often; exactly what we aspire our pupils and students to be.

In the same way athletes train to enhance muscular strength, through conscious planned attention and practice, exercised regularly and consistently, muscles become stronger and we are able to rely on our capabilities when the pressure is on. The Physical Education curriculum aims to harness character strength, where practise becomes permanent and we flourish as model citizens.

We purposefully invite pupils and students to practise character virtues by putting every young person outside of their comfort zone practically and socially. By recognising the individual who runs the slowest but does not give up, the individual who stops to help advise a peer where they went wrong, or the individual who puts their hand out first to shake their opponents hand at the end of a game, our pupils and students recognise that PE is far from just 'being good' at sport, and encourages modelling good sportpersonship and teamwork.

Sport provides the opportunity to teach young people what good character looks and feels like, and how it can impact success and teamwork. Through our commitment to demonstrate this in our lessons, pupils and students are then able to apply these qualities to other areas of their lives, inspiring the next generation of citizens who will flourish in society.

#### What we do

We provide explicit opportunities for leadership to encourage young people to make decisions and empower pupils and students to understand when a decision is right or wrong and to get them to reflect on the impact this has on others. In years 10 and 11 this term, pupils have embarked on a Leadership Pathway and achieved the Level 1 Sports Leaders UK Award in conjunction with the charity Sport4Life.



We also work with organisations such as they YST (Youth Sports Trust) and their Girls Active Programme, and University Sports Clubs to seek further leadership opportunities in our community. Consequently, not only are our pupils and students practicing their civic virtues – we are ensuring that as an organisation, they are being virtuous by sharing our wisdom, kindness and generosity in the local area.

#### **Sport at UoB School**

The School is back to full swing with its sporting endeavours, having competed in fourteen different sporting fixtures across the city since October half term. Individuals and teams have collectively participated in rowing, athletics, table tennis, rugby, football and handball, representing the School and our district of South Birmingham against local and regional rivals. Looking ahead to the festive break, there are many more fixtures in store for all year groups, including our Sixth Form, to compete in indoor cricket, volleyball, basketball, badminton and hockey.

There are nine different sports clubs which take place before and after School weekly, attracting hundreds of pupils to participate recreationally, socially and competitively. Our Year 7 and 8 pupils in particular have really benefited from the social benefits of sport, getting to know each other and making friends from different class groups. Our examination pupils and students are also reaping the benefits of their hard work and commitment, using enrichment sessions to bolster their practical sporting portfolios. Sport at University of Birmingham School is bright, and we are really excited to see where the future takes us!

## A TRAINING SCHOOL

Close to ninety trainee teachers from the University of Birmingham have had their first week 'serial placements' at University of Birmingham School.

Trainee teachers from Biology, History, Mathematics and Physical Education joined us for one week as their first introduction to secondary teaching – for many, it's the first time they have been in school since they were pupils themselves! Subject leaders from UoB School worked closely with their UoB subject tutor counterparts to put together a cohesive series of lesson observations and small group teaching, so that they can begin to understand what it means to join our noble profession as moral educators. The trainee teachers also have the opportunity to learn about how we teach Character Education, and many joined in enthusiastically with our enrichment programme. Eight students in various departments will also be completing their first teaching placements with us.

We were particularly delighted to be able to offer a short placement to a student from our first ever Sixth Form cohort. Riel joined our Sixth Form in 2015, and after completing a fine Art degree in London, has returned to Birmingham to train to be a teacher. Her work still graces our walls here and continues to inspire our Sixth Form artists – a couple of whom remember her from when they were in Year 7!

We continue to share our passion for inspiring roots into teaching by working with students from the University in their final year, offering lectures, tours, and placement opportunities. 45 students who are taking a module in 'Introduction to Teaching' spent time with us this term, and students from Biology, Physics and Computer Studies are currently undertaking a placement here, observing lessons and mentoring A level students.

As a University Training School we are also becoming more involved in research with the University. We are currently collaborating with other schools and the University of Birmingham on a large cross city project mapping the challenges and barriers to race equality in the context of pandemic disruption, through cross-city conversations with parent, pupil and teacher groups, which will then inform future professional development for schools in the City and beyond. The Psychology and Physics departments are undertaking smaller research projects with various universities, and we continue to be involved closely with research with the Jubilee Centre for Character Virtues.

## **ALUMNI ALERT!**

Former UoBS Sixth Form student Baúan has recently graduated from the University of Birmingham and has set up his own sustainable, eco-friendly delivery service – Kaientai, in partnership with his brother. He visited UoB School this term to talk to our younger pupils about his journey so far, in hopes to inspire the next generation of learners and entrepreneurs.



## **UB RACING**

A group of A level Physics students visited the School of Engineering at the University of Birmingham in November. The students were particularly interested in studying mechanical engineering or a similar discipline after A levels.

Engineering students from the University provided a guided tour of the new, impressive engineering building and surrounding areas on campus.

Alongside studying for their degree, UoB students also benefit from being able to take part in enrichment clubs and societies. Not only are these a great way to socialise and meet other students, they enrich the experience, knowledge, and skill set of those involved. 'UB Racing' consists of a group of students, who in their own time, plan, build, and race a kit car. Our Sixth Form students were lucky enough to be able to view the racing workshop and had great discussions with current UoB students about the types of courses and potential careers they could pursue in the near future.





## **ARISTOTLE IN ARIZONA**



It is our mission at University of Birmingham School that the people in our communities flourish and inspire other citizens to build better communities and a better world.

The 'Aristotle in Arizona' project will take eight of our pupils and students from Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5, with three accompanying staff members, to visit three schools in Arizona that have a similar mission, to see the extent to which Global British Values are in fact Global Values, and explore the similarities and differences between our schools.

The pupils, students, and staff will immerse themselves in a classical education at three Great Heart Schools within a curriculum built upon a classical liberal arts tradition, and seek to compare and contrast our own Aristotelean neo ethics with their intention to cultivate the hearts and minds of students in the pursuit of Truth, Goodness, and Beauty.

Participants will be expected to take part in a live stream across the Atlantic between schools and the project will continue in the UK with pupils, students, and staff creating a short series of presentations based on what they have learnt in their immersion in classical education, as well as what they have learnt about how far virtues transcend continents.

Virtue is practical, so there is little point in knowing what is theoretically virtuous if it is not practised. This opportunity will provide pupils and students with the chance to develop courage, empathy, kindness and curiosity; to practically engage in global citizenship and social action and to develop judgement, reasoning and resourcefulness, life- long skills that will help them live a purposeful life.

We've had an overwhelming amount of applications from our pupils and students. Successful applicants will be informed of their selection by the end of the year.

The project is being funded by the Turing Foundation.
