MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers, and Friends of the School,

I write with the summer term 2021 now behind us, to introduce the University School's summer newsletter.

Since February 2020 members of the School community have needed to respond to changing coronavirus-related circumstances; as indeed we have all had to in our lives more widely. At the start of January this year, the announcement of a further period of national lockdown saw learning and support revert to home and remote provision for almost nine weeks. Our children, and the School's staff, are to be commended on their determination to establish continuity of the highest possible standard – including teaching, pastoral support, and access to technology where needed.



As we now look ahead to the new School year in September, let us be optimistic of a more stable 2021/22 so that on site education can re-establish itself to the fullest and richest extent. In my end of term letter (which may be accessed also on our School website) I outlined the arrangements which leaders and staff are planning for the start of the term – including on site Covid-19 lateral flow testing – and to support learning more broadly. Please be assured that plans will continue to focus strongly on health and well-being, so that alongside our educational ambition the School community remains Covid-cautious, safe, and able to respond appropriately to any changing circumstances.

I write these opening remarks to the newsletter on the same day as the Opening Ceremony of the Tokyo Olympics. Across the coming six weeks or so, athletes from across the world will push for their personal bests across diverse sports – motivated and determined to excel. There will be without doubt very many inspirational moments typified so often by sport – of humanity and humility.



For the first time at these Olympics, surfing is one of five new sports included. Through this, I have engaged with the lived experience of Bethany Hamilton, aged 31, an American professional surfer. Bethany offers many reflections from her life – including courage – and I would suggest that she possesses and has demonstrated that in the highest order. Many of our children will be understandably anxious with the arrival of a new term in September – building back from disrupted learning across the last two years, to those joining a new School without the normal comfort that in–person induction affords. I can do no better than point them to Bethany's words stated opposite.

Our Year 11 Graduates (GCSE results day – 12th August) and Year 13 Graduates (A level results day – 10th August) will attend to collect their Teacher Assessed Grades over the summer break. We are all so impressed by the manner in which these young people have responded to learning and personal development in the context of great variability and disruption. As each pupil and student takes their next onward step, all members of the School wish them every future happiness and success.

To our parents, carers, and families, I send my appreciation of your support and partnership for the School – and to everyone, wishes for a happy summer ahead. Please enjoy our newsletter.

PUPIL SETS UP FUNDRAISER IN MEMORY OF LATE GRANDFATHER

Year 10 Pupil Ary has been raising awareness and funds for a charity close to his heart, Wheels to Heal, who provide mobility aids for disabled children and adults in less advantaged countries.

Wheels to Heal, a UK based charity, recycle unwanted and used mobility and disability aids, and gives them a new life. These are then gifted to those in need in countries such as Bangladesh, Iraq, Lebanon, Malawi, and Pakistan to name a few.

Ary took part in a 5 kilometre sponsored walk, with the intention of raising £10,000 for the charity. "I want to continue my grandfather's legacy and help children in various poor countries and provide equipment for their mobility and independence." Ary.

Not only did Ary reach his target, he raised more than expected! "Within just four days we reached 70% of our initial target. Thank you so much for your kindness and generosity." In July, a shipping container full of mobility equipment, left for Kurdistan to aid those in need.

We are very proud of Ary at UoB School. He has shown an abundance of kindness and compassion with this charitable act. It takes great determination and motivation to pursue such a challenge and we can't wait to hear more about his charitable updates in the near future.

LEADERSHIP ROLES SHAPING THE FUTURE...

Our Transition Leaders will be a source of help for pupils, become role models for all year groups, and represent our school accordingly.

A number of our current Year 7 pupils applied for this position and were interviewed by UoB School staff. We are delighted to announce that eighteen pupils were successful and have been appointed as our new Pupil Transition Leaders. Congratulations to you all and we look forward to working with you in the new school year.



LOCAL PUPILS' BENCH DESIGN BROUGHT TO LIFE

A new bench, designed by pupils from University of Birmingham School, was unveiled on 15 June 2021.

The bench marks the completion of the Selly Oak New Road Phase 1B scheme, which consists of major highway improvements around the 'Selly Oak Triangle' on Birmingham's primary road network.

A key aim of the scheme was to improve connectivity in Selly Oak, with a major focus on upgrading facilities for people walking, cycling and using public transport.

In addition, the team wanted to give something back to the local community that could be enjoyed for years to come. Local schools were approached in January 2020 to design a bench that represented the area of Selly Oak and its history.

Year 7 pupils at University of Birmingham School took up the challenge, with the winning design brought to life and unveiled by Birmingham City Council's Cabinet Member for Transport and the Environment, Councillor Waseem Zaffar.



Cllr Zaffar said: "The former Selly Oak Triangle had a range of issues from congestion to a lack of facilities for cyclists and pedestrians. These improvements have enabled better traffic management and encourage modal shift to walking, cycling and public transport – delivering a better network for everyone.

"I want to thank everyone involved in the Selly Oak New Road scheme for delivering such a fantastic project, including our contractor McPhillips who have also installed this community bench. Congratulations to the pupils from University of Birmingham School for coming up with such a brilliant design."

It was the first time the pupils, who are now in Year 8, had seen their winning design in real life. It is located on the footway of Bristol Road near its junction with Oak Tree Lane in Selly Oak, Birmingham.

Ernest Addo-Boateng, Subject Leader for Design and Technology at University of Birmingham School said: "Our pupils really enjoyed this project and had so many creative ideas. It's been fantastic for the pupils to see their design go from a piece of paper to something that the community will enjoy for years to come."

The design depicts the famous oak tree that formerly stood at the Bristol Road/Oak Tree Lane crossroads, including a witch flying in to it.

Millie, a pupil at University of Birmingham School said: "We wanted to reflect the history of the area in our design. One story is that a witch called 'Sally' was hanged from the tree and coined the name 'Sally Oak' which later turned into Selly Oak."

The design also includes Queens University Hospital, people playing football and running, and lots of trees and flowers. Evie and Hafsha were keen to ensure nature was a key part of the design and said: "We added the flowers and leaves to represent parks and nature, which is something we love about Selly Oak."

Ralph, also a pupil at University of Birmingham school added: "We also wanted the bench to reflect a healthy lifestyle."

The scheme was overseen by Birmingham City Council with construction carried out by McPhillips (Wellington) and full detailed design support from Jacobs.



Paul Handley, Contracts Manager at McPhillips said: "We have been delighted to have been involved with such an important project for the Selly Oak area and to deliver another key highway improvement project for Birmingham City Council. As with all projects of this nature it came with its challenges, of course most significantly COVID19, but McPhillips are really pleased with the final scheme. It's great to see that the aims of the project, which were to reduce traffic congestion and make significant improvements for pedestrians and cyclist, have well and truly been fulfilled.

"The bench is a great addition to the project, and it was an honour for us to be able to bring the children's fantastic artwork to life. We'd like to take this opportunity to thank everyone involved but especially the local residents for being so patient with us throughout the works."

"Projects like the completion of this phase of the Selly Oak New Road will strategically drive inclusive economic growth through supporting nearby developments like the Birmingham Health Innovation Campus where the GBSLEP has allocated £10.8 million from the Government's Getting Building Fund for the Precision Heath Technologies Accelerator (PHTA). It will also support our communities through unlocking development land, creating jobs and easing congestion that will benefit the local businesses."


SPORTS SANCTUARY

When we overlay this with the outcomes that sport provides – reducing stress and anxiety, improving cognitive function, enhancing mood, creativity and social interactions – we can start to see how these spaces of sanctuary, or indeed using sport as our sanctuary, can increase our overall health and wellbeing.

The Physical Education department have been pleased to have been able to offer sports sanctuaries to all pupils in years 7, 8 and 9 this term as a space to connect with peers, a space to let off steam and gain a sense of relief from pressures experienced during the school day or in general day to day life.

Pupils suggested sporting activities of interest. The more typical sports of Football, Netball and Basketball were constant contenders, alongside less traditional offers of 'Capture the Flag, Tug-o-war, Ultimate Frisbee, Tchukball and swing ball'.

With music playing in the background, our sports sanctuary became a place of solace not just for pupils, but UoB School staff alike. Thank you to all members of our community who contributed to this space so positively.



YOUTH SPORTS TRUST

A group of Year 9 pupils have taken their initial steps to become sports activators. IN OTHER NEWS...




A level Politics students met virtually with Lord Jim Knight this term for a live Q&A to support their studies on UK Parliament.
