Joining us in Year 7

A School for everyone. We're proud to be a diverse and inclusive comprehensive School & Sixth Form truly representative of our city. We are academically non-selective in Years 7 to 11 and take pupils from four 'nodes' across Birmingham to create a diverse learning community. We provide our pupils with the opportunity to learn earlier in life that the world is full of different people, cultures and attitudes which helps to build great character and more rounded citizens.

Each year we admit 150 pupils. We don't have a specific 'catchment area' as we operate a nodal system, taking pupils from four different locations across Birmingham.

A node is a central point, determined by co-ordinates on a map, and not a postcode area, from which measurements will begin. Our nodes are the main reception entrance of the School, and the entrance of the railway stations in Hall Green, the Jewellery Quarter, and Small Heath.

The determined number of pupils admitted from each node, per year, is:

- The University of Birmingham School main entrance

 up to 75 pupils (50%).
- Hall Green Station up to 25 pupils (16.7%).
- Jewellery Quarter Station up to 25 pupils (16.7%).
- Small Heath Station up to 25 pupils (16.7%).

Distance will be calculated by Birmingham City Council as a straight line measurement between the applicant's home and the main entrance of the nearest node (as the crow flies). In the event that a tie break situation occurs for the distance criteria, a random allocation tie break will be used.

Our Curriculum

All of our young people, regardless of background and prior learning experiences, should have access to the best that has been thought, said, written and discovered. We aim to deliver this through an academically-focused and knowledge-based curriculum, underpinned by a taught, caught and sought character education programme, so that pupils develop the virtues, and embed the knowledge needed to understand the world, contribute to society, and change it for the better. At University of Birmingham School, we plot the entire learning journey from Year 6 to undergraduate study in each subject – crossing key stages – but taking account of external examinations along the way. Designed by subject specialists, the curriculum aims to inspire a curiosity and love for the subject by tapping into the exciting stories and wonderful experiences beyond the core knowledge, whilst giving pupils the solid foundations necessary to ensure academic success. Rather than just 'teaching chemistry or languages' we consider that we are 'creating young chemists and linguists'.

Enrichment

As humans, we learn and grow from new experiences. Enrichment is a vital part of our 'taught, caught and sought' character education curriculum, where these additional learning opportunities enable pupils to put into practice virtues such as courage, curiosity and resilience that they have learnt about during the School week. Our enrichment programme helps pupils to understand better the unique relationship we have with our University, as well as trying new cultural and social experiences that expand their understanding of the world.

At University of Birmingham School, enrichment is not extra-curricular, it's a core part of our School week. From knitting to spin cycle class, from mixed crafts to street first aid, from the die-hard Harry Potter Fan Club to slam poetry, our range of enrichment activities change each term, offering a truly broad education for pupils.

All Year 9 pupils take part in the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Awards programme. This nationally recognised award combines fun, adventure, social action, and new challenges. Thereafter some choose to advance further to higher awards.



Character Education

Character Education includes educating the part of the self that makes difficult and moral decisions. As a School, we believe that our job is to prepare the children in our care to have moral agency and be ready for 'the tests of life, not a life of tests', meaning that we commit to offering planned learning opportunities and an environment that enables our pupils to flourish in the widest sense. It is our intent that people in our communities – adults and children – flourish and inspire other citizens to build better communities and a better world. Character Education is a conduit for this as we aim to create the space to nurture content, engaged, and fulfilled citizens.

We want our pupils to grow up to be kind, honest, curious, and brave citizens with the resilience and perseverance to make wise choices and do what's right. Excellent behaviour and excellent learning should be second nature, not something that one has to work at constantly; it should simply be the way that we are. This is a state of mind that we want all our pupils to attain and sustain, not just at School, but for the rest of their lives.

Moral Virtues

Compassion, Empathy, Honesty, Humility, Loyalty, Sensitivity, Responsibility, Generosity.

Civic Virtues

Service, Citizenship, Volunteering, Community Awareness & Spirit, Social Justice, Responsibility.

Performance Virtues

Ambition, Creativity, Curiosity, Determination, Resilience, Self-reliance, Reliability, Self-discipline.

Intellectual Virtues

Reflection, Focus, Curiosity, Resourcefulness, Critical Thinking.

How is character embedded?

We are what we repeatedly do.

We call the values or strengths that need to be developed to make wise choices and live a purposeful life 'virtues'.

Taught character

We give time in the curriculum to teach these virtues explicitly, starting by teaching a virtue vocabulary and sharing examples of what virtue – and vice – look like in real life. Pupils are then encouraged to practise virtuous behaviours until they become embedded habits.

Caught Character

This is the absorbing of character virtue through seeing it modelled well by others. We make a concerted effort to act with wisdom, patience and consideration, ensuring that every interaction between adults and children is a place for good character to be taught. Learning happens in all corners of our building and how we conduct conversations with our children and each other is absorbed and held on to by all in our care.

Sought Character

Having begun to gain virtue knowledge, we make sure there are opportunities for pupils to seek out to practise their character – through joining a choir, climbing a mountain or helping others.





Additional Information

Pastoral Care

The pastoral care of our pupils and students is at the heart of our School, and drives all that we do here at University of Birmingham School. Our aim is for every pupil and student to be safe and happy which will, in turn, enable them to flourish, achieving their potential in both the classroom and in the wider community. Pastoral care begins with the form tutor. Our form tutors share time with their tutor group each day, supporting them and delivering our Learning for Life (L4L) programme, and fostering strong relationships with pupils, students, and families.

Support for pupils with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities

It is important to us that all pupils and students are able to flourish in our School, regardless of their abilities or disabilities. Our School building is fully accessible for pupils and students with disabilities and we have a dedicated team to provide tailored support for pupils and students with Special Educational Needs, overseen by an experienced Assistant Principal (SENCO). We also work closely with all relevant agencies across the city and beyond.
